THE AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

Let us declare our faith in God

We believe in one God,

the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,

the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father,

God from God, Light from Light,

true God from true God, begotten, not made,

of one Being with the Father;

through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

The Lord be with you And also with you


Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.


Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give thanks and praise.


The priest praises God for his mighty acts and at the end we sing

Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

Reflection

O thou, who at thy Eucharist didst pray

Postlude

Voluntary, Walter G Alcock, 1861-1947

Sir Walter Galpin Alcock MVO was an English organist and composer. He held several prominent positions as an organist and had the unique distinction of playing at the coronations of three kings: Edward VII (1902), George V (1911) and George VI (1937). He was Professor of Organ at the Royal College of Music, London, assistant organist of Westminster Abbey from 1896, and concurrently organist of the Chapels Royal from 1902. In 1916 he became organist of Salisbury Cathedral where he oversaw a strictly faithful restoration of the famous Father Willis organ. Alcock was knighted in 1933 for services to music. He was a distinguished teacher, whose published material for organ

students is still thought valuable. His hobbies included the construction of a model railway, on which choirboys at Salisbury would be given rides. He died at the age of 85 and his funeral service was held in Salisbury Cathedral.
