THE AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

Let us declare our faith in God.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

The Lord be with you **And also with you**


Lift up your hearts.

Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

Pastorale BWV 590 First Movement

Johann Sebastian Bach 1685-1750

Johann Sebastian Bach was best known during his lifetime as an organist, organ consultant, and composer of organ works in both the traditional German free genres, for example preludes, fantasias, and toccatas and stricter forms for example chorale preludes and fugues. At a young age, he established a reputation for creativity and ability to integrate foreign styles into his organ works. The Pastorale was composed about 1720 in Leipzig. Here the piffero or pipe melody is in canon over a drone reflecting the shepherds playing on their pipes as they shepherd their sheep.
