The Advent Crown is a symbol of the light of Christ coming into the world and into the darkness of our lives. As the Advent Crown is lit,

Jesus said, 'Do not think that I have come to abolish the law and the prophets: I have not come to abolish them but to fulfil them. Amen. Come soon, Lord Jesus!

The second candle is lit and this response is used

# THE PRAYER OF PREPARATION


The prayer is introduced ending with,

#### THE SERMON

We stand

#### THE AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

Let us declare our faith in God.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

# Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.


Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

THE LORD'S PRAYER



### Creator alme Siderum No 1 from Sixteen Chorales for Sundays in Advent Mighty Creator of the Skies Marcel Dupré 1886-1971

The Postlude comes from a collection of sixteen chorales entitled: Le Tombeau de Titelouze. Titelouze was an organist at the Cathedral St John in Rouen, and the Chorales are based on his hymns. This chorale is for use on Sundays in Advent: 'Creator Alme Siderum, Aeterna lux credentium, Jesu, Redemptor omnium, intende votis supplicum.' Translates: Mighty Creator of the stars, eternal Light of believers, Jesus, Redeemer of mankind, hearken to our beseeching prayers.
