
# The Buzz







Thought for the Month



As December unfolds, our focus turns to the flurry of celebrations and the mounting anticipation that fill the calendar—cards to write, gifts to select, and menus for the Christmas feast to plan. The world is alive with activity, with expectation growing with every passing day. Christmas, that cherished celebration, weaves together a tapestry of memories—each year adding a new layer to our traditions, as beloved decorations emerge from their boxes and a few new treasures find their place, casting fresh light and joy upon the familiar.

This December, however, joy feels more tangible, no longer shadowed by sorrow as it has been in recent years. As we sing of Bethlehem, lying in darkness beneath silent stars, our hearts are deeply moved by the news that, at last, peace, albeit a fragile peace has taken hold in Gaza and Palestine. The ancient longing for ransom and release, so beautifully voiced in J. M. Neale's timeless "O come, O come Emmanuel," now resounds as a song of hope fulfilled and wounds beginning to heal. The safety and warmth of our festivities now stand not in contrast, but in harmony, with the renewed hope and relief felt in both Gaza and Israel.

As I write these words in early November, I am hopeful that, as you read them, peace will still be holding—what once seemed impossible has come to pass, and long-unanswered prayers are finding their response. The prophet Isaiah, whose words guide us through Advent, proclaims, "How beautiful on the mountains are the feet of those who bring good news, who proclaim peace, who bring good tidings, who proclaim salvation." This is more than optimism; it is the assurance of God drawing us outward in hope. How precious, then, is the reality of peace in our time, that the arrival of its messenger is truly beautiful, and that we are witnesses to the dawn of renewed reconciliation and joy.

Our Advent readings echo with hope in the seemingly impossible—the assurance that a light shines in the darkness, one that darkness cannot overcome. We return to these words, year after year, as the nights stretch long and candles flicker with promise.

Each Advent, we discover new depths of meaning, new reasons to cling to these promises. Their familiarity comforts us, yet also invites us to consider: Are our eyes fixed on the humble manger, where the infant Jesus will soon rest? Is our heart set on his promised return? Do we remember where our hope is rooted, and whom we are waiting for?

He has come once, and will come again: first, as a child among us, reaching up in trust that loving hands would reach down to him—his love and confidence in our capacity to love transforming and healing all humanity. He will come again to bring all waiting to its fulfilment, to usher in perfect peace and an end to suffering and death. This is the promise of Advent.

But what of the time between that first Christmas and the one still to come—what of the present, with its mingling of joy and sorrow? Now we are called to watch and wait, to open our hearts to the Spirit of Christ, transforming each moment with a love that never tires, that never rests until healing is complete. With that love, we are taught to turn our thoughts, hopes, and actions toward goodness, attending to the world around us and bearing the glad tidings it so desperately needs—for even now, wonder and joy remain, and the light shines undiminished in the darkness.

May I take this opportunity to wish you all an expectant Advent and when it comes a joyful, blessed and peace filled Christmas.

One of our recent successes was supporting a mum who was living in a damp, mouldy and dark basement flat with her toddler and young baby. There was a small sleeping area with no windows for ventilation which the family had to share. This often resulted in the parent having to sleep on the sofa. There was no heating and no space for a washing machine. The flat above was occupied by an anti-social neighbour who made a great deal of noise during the nights, keeping the family awake

and causing distress and anxiety. The partner had to live separately due to the cramped conditions in the flat. We supported the family as they went through the system and now, they are living in a house in a part of their area that they love, with space for the children that is free from the concerns of antisocial behaviour.

All that we do FSW is in partnership, firstly there is the link between the family and the practitioner but equally as important is the link between FSW and you. We can only do our work because of the generosity of people across Sussex, so thank you for your ever generous support. Together we can support our families as they make lasting changes to their lives.
