PRAYERS OF PENITENCE


The grace of God has dawned upon the world through our Saviour Jesus Christ, who sacrificed himself for us to purify a people as his own. Let us confess our sins.

THE SERMON

THE AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

Let us declare our faith in God

We believe in one God,
the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is, seen and unseen.
We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God, begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father;
through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was
incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary
and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER


The Lord be with you **And also with you**

Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.


For the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

The Giving of Communion

Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper.

Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, But only say the word and I shall be healed.

Draw near with faith. Receive the Body of our Lord Jesus Christ which he gave for you, and his blood which he shed for you. Eat and drink in remembrance that he died for you, feed on him in your hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

Please wait to be directed for Communion.

The sacrament will be administered to the congregation in both kinds. As the priest offers you the host with the words 'The Body of Christ' please respond: Amen.

As you are offered the chalice, please remember you won't be permitted to handle the sides of the chalice only the base. When you are offered the chalice to take a sip with the words **The Blood of Christ**, please respond **Amen**.

You will not be permitted to 'dip' the host into the chalice and must consume the host before receiving wine from the chalice. There is no need now to return to your seat with the host in your hands.

Postlude

Fantasia in C Major BWV 570

Johann Sebastian Bach 1685-1750

Bach was a staunch Lutheran and his belief permeates his music. His scores would begin with the words, 'Jesu Juva', meaning, 'Jesus help' and ending with the letters SDG, 'Soli Deo Gloria', to God alone be the glory'. This Fantasia in C major, BWV570 was probably written on two staves. The long pedal points suggest similarities with the toccatas of Pachelbel and, after a brief opening, reminiscent of certain French models, the piece is dominated by the figure—quaver and two semiquavers—heard first in the sixth bar and then developed throughout the rest of the piece. Harmonic interest is maintained through brief chromatic excursions and chains of suspensions. A brief postlude, marked by a rising semiquaver figure, balances the introduction.

I would like to invite everyone in the diocese to keep 2023 as a year of the Old Testament. Next year is the first of two special years [2024 will be the Year of the New Testament] leading up to the 2025 which we will keep as a special Year of Faith.

2025 celebrates 1700 years since the Council of Nicaea which gave us what became the Nicene Creed. It also marks 950 years of Christian mission in a diocese based in Chichester. Hence why the three-year programme is know as Proclaiming the Mystery of Faith.

The Year of the Old Testament will reflect on the Hebrew Scriptures. We will seek to understand the Law, the Prophets and the Writings in their original context, and see more clearly how they point us towards Jesus Christ and the gospel, and to our own knowledge of him in the history of his body, the Church.

The Old Testament speaks repeatedly of God as One and as Holy. So we hope that this Year will help us to understand how the Old Testament guides the Church to be 'one' and 'holy': the first two of the 'marks of the Church' and part of our diocesan strategy.
