## THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

Celebrant        The Lord be with you  
                      **and also with you.**

Lift up your hearts.  
**We lift them to the Lord.**

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.  
**It is right to give thanks and praise.**

It is indeed right, it is our duty and our joy,  
at all times and in all places to give you thanks and  
praise, holy Father, heavenly King, almighty and eternal  
God, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Celebrant

All glory be to you, our heavenly Father, who, in your tender mercy, gave your only Son our Saviour Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption; who made there by his one oblation of himself once offered a full, perfect and sufficient sacrifice, oblation and satisfaction for the sins of the whole world; he instituted, and in his holy gospel commanded us to continue, a perpetual memory of his precious death until he comes again.

Hear us, merciful Father, we humbly pray, and grant that, by the power of your Holy Spirit, we, receiving these gifts of your creation, this bread and this wine, according to your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood; who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper he took the cup and gave you thanks; he gave it to them, saying: Drink this, all of you, this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Praise to you, Lord Jesus:

**Dying you destroyed our death, rising you restored our life: Lord Jesus, come in glory.**

Therefore, Lord and heavenly Father, in remembrance of the precious death and passion, the mighty resurrection and glorious ascension of your dear Son

Jesus Christ, we offer you through him this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving.

Grant that by his merits and death, and through faith in his Blood, we and all your Church may receive forgiveness of our sins and all other benefits of his passion.

Although we are unworthy, through our manifold sins, to offer you any sacrifice, yet we pray that you will accept this the duty and service that we owe.

Do not weigh our merits, but pardon our offences, and fill us all who share in this holy communion with your grace and heavenly blessing; through Jesus Christ our Lord, by whom, and with whom, and in whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever.

### ***The Breaking of the Bread***

*The Priest breaks the consecrated bread*

Celebrant      Every time we eat this bread and drink this cup,  
**we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.**

## **Praeludium in G Minor BWV558**

*Johann Sebastian Bach 1685-1750*

*The authorship of the Eight Little Preludes and Fugues is debated, some argue they were composed by a pupil of Bach. He composed during the years 1708-1717. The G minor prelude here is similar to an Italian courante, a court dance for couples prominent in the late 16th Century. The fugue is very symmetrical in structure with a subject and one strong rhythmic or melodic motive. The pedal has a purely harmonic function. reflecting the influences of other composers of the period including Bach. This short work, I suggest, reflects the prevailing mood as we move forward from one era, the second Elizabethan era, to a new era, that of Charles III, but with a constant, the Monarchy, that bridges the two. God save the king.*

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
