THE SERMON

We stand

THE AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

Let us declare our faith in God.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light,

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true God from true God, begotten, not made,

of one Being with the Father;

through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son,

who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

The Presentation of the Gifts

During the Offertory hymn the bread and wine and the collection are brought to the altar and the altar is prepared.

During the Preparation of the Table:


THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

The prayer continues and concludes with the doxology where we respond,




THE LORD'S PRAYER

The Giving of Communion

When you are offered the chalice to take a sip with the words '**The Blood of Christ**,' please respond **Amen**.

Sigfried Karg-Elert 1877-1933

Sigfrid Karg-Elert was a prominent and prolific composer at a time when German composers were overshadowed by their more popular French contemporaries. Karg-Elert's music is vast in quantity and diverse in style. Nun danket alle Gott ("Now Thank We All Our God") is perhaps Karg-Elert's most famous work for organ. Its grandeur and magnificence his musical style can be characterised as being late-romantic with impressionistic and expressionistic tendencies. His profound knowledge of music theory allowed him to stretch the limits of traditional harmony without losing tonal coherence. Nun Danket is part of the 66 Chorale Improvisations for organ composed between 1906 and 1908
