Thought for the Month

Embracing New Beginnings and Missed Opportunities



September has always felt to me like a subtle turning of the year—a quiet invitation to begin anew. Perhaps it's a throwback to childhood routines: the first days of school, uniform a bit too big "so you can grow into it," stiff new shoes not yet broken in, and a pristine pencil case packed with freshly sharpened pencils. There is excitement in the air, tinged with a touch of apprehension—the gentle ending of summer's seemingly endless days, and the hopeful promise of something yet to come.

This isn't a new year in the way Advent is, with its dark, penitential mystery and silent waiting. Nor is it like the Gregorian calendar's 1st January, marked by fireworks, popping corks, and general jollity.

Instead, autumn offers a quieter, more reflective kind of renewal, as the world lets go of the fizz of spring and the abundance of summer. Stephen Cottrell, the Archbishop of York, once described this early autumn season in a poem written during a pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela:

The earth has relinquished the fizz of spring and the fecund abundance of summer...
There are still leaves on the tree, but they are on the ground as well. Fruits are ripe for picking: fig, walnut, lime.
Fruiting and falling. Both.

It's a good time to take stock. Perhaps you've come back from holiday, feeling rested and refreshed. Or maybe the lighter pace of summer—quieter streets, fewer emails and phone calls—has brought its own kind of rest. As life's rhythms quicken again, there's wisdom in pausing to reflect on the past year, considering both what has been and what might lie ahead.

For many, this season aligns with the Jewish New Year, Rosh Hashanah, which falls in September or October. This is a sober and reflective two-day period, marked by traditions such as Tashlich, where people cast breadcrumbs or pieces of bread—symbolising their sins—into flowing water. It's a time to look back over the year's successes and failures and to make amends for hurts and mistakes. Yet, Rosh Hashanah is also a surprising opportunity to reflect on missed chances—to ask oneself where one might have been more proactive or adventurous, where fruit might have come from a fall, or a fall might have led to fruit.

Fruiting and falling. Falling and fruiting.

This reflection isn't exclusive to any one tradition. For Christians, too, it can be a season for honest self-examination. Have there been moments in the past year when we hesitated, when we drew back from the water's edge, missing opportunities to be bold or to welcome the unexpected? Did we fail to recognise the chance to "entertain angels unaware" (Hebrews 13:2)? The missed opportunities, failures, or regrets may fall away, carried by the stream, but through prayerful and honest reflection, these moments can become the fertile ground for new beginnings—lessons learned, courage renewed.

The Bible is rich with stories of simple encounters that shaped lives and history, often hinging on moments that might easily have been missed: Elisha being found by Elijah behind the plough and receiving the prophetic mantle (1 Kings 19:16). The curiosity of Pharaoh's daughter by the river, where she discovered the baby Moses (Exodus 1:5). Simon and Andrew's first encounter with Jesus on the lakeshore (Mark 1:16-17). Mary's humble acceptance of the angel's message: "*let it be with me according to thy word*" (Luke 1:38). Philip's meeting with the Ethiopian treasurer and sharing the gospel (Acts 8:26-31).

As this gentle new year unfolds, it is a fitting moment to resolve to greet each day with expectation—that divine opportunities might invite us to step somewhere new, to form unexpected relationships, or to be inspired in surprising ways. Let us pray for open hearts, ready for God's purpose, and for the courage not to let those moments slip by.

Each September, as the earth lets go and bears fruit in equal measure, we too are called to let go, to reflect, and to look forward—ready for the adventures and opportunities that await.
